A LETTER FROM OUR LEADERSHIP

Dear Friends and Supporters,

Unprecedented. Challenging. Uncertain. There is no lack of descriptors for the year 2020. For those of us at the Wyoming Stock Growers Land Trust (WSGLT), this past year reinforced the significance of the work we do. 2020 brought into sharp focus the importance of keeping agricultural lands productive and intact - for those who steward the land, for all who call this vast state home, for our visitors, and for future generations.

Through a changing world and changing leadership, WSGLT continues to work with landowners to conserve their agricultural lands. Despite restrictions, we were able to successfully monitor our existing acreage under conservation easement, upholding a necessary requirement for an accredited land trust. In fiscal year 2020, we added two new conservation easements on over 5,600 acres, conserving important wildlife and riparian habitats in southern Wyoming. We are working to conserve another 6,000 acres in fiscal year 2021. Interest in using voluntary conservation easements to preserve open spaces, wildlife habitat, and an agricultural heritage continues. We are excited to keep building our partnerships with landowners, state and federal governments, and other non-profit and for-profit entities to meet an ever-growing need to protect Wyoming's working agricultural landscapes.

For over twenty years, through hard times and good times, you have helped the Wyoming Stock Growers Land Trust build a foundation for the future of our organization. We would not have these stories to tell without you. We are honored to lead WSGLT as we move forward and build upon our successes.

In 1877, William and Mary Ferguson settled in the rugged hills west of Cheyenne. Their homestead included a small dairy which was a full day's trip by wagon to the creamery in Cheyenne. William and Mary's grandchildren formed a trust to protect the ranch and keep the property under single ownership. In 2019, a portion of the Jaw Bone Ranch, operated by the fourth and fifth generations of the family, was placed under a conservation easement held by the Wyoming Stock Growers Land Trust.

Nestled between Granite and Crystal Reservoirs, the property contributes to the City of Cheyenne's water supply. The ranch is also surrounded by Curt Gowdy State Park. Facing increasing development pressure, the family chose to enter into a conservation easement with the Wyoming Stock Growers Land Trust to protect 560 acres of their agricultural land. In doing so, the family is protecting an important water supply, prime winter and yearlong habitat for mule deer, seasonal habitat for other big game species, and a portion of the South Fork of Middle Crow Creek.

The Jaw Bone Gulch Ranch offers a refuge away from civilization for both humans and animals. Wildlife pressured by development find a haven on the ranch. Humans pressured by that same development find open spaces and scenic views in the middle of an extensively developed area. Jaw Bone Gulch Ranch is an example of leveraging working agricultural landscapes to protect the public values of watersheds, wildlife habitat and neighboring recreational destinations. Multiple use of any landscape is a balance and Wyoming's ranching families, their heritage, and their continued dedication to land stewardship are an integral part of that balance.

Jaw Bone Gulch Ranch

Laramie County

Mark and Valerie Condict initiated a conservation easement on the Condict and Sons Ranch in 2016 to conserve the property's immense agricultural and wildlife values. The ranch was originally homesteaded by the Condict family in 1884 and has since supported livestock and hay production, along with six generations of the Condict family.

The ranch is nestled in the scenic Upper North Platte River Valley where it is surrounded by majestic views of the Sierra Madre and Snowy Mountain Ranges. The rolling sagebrush hills rise from the valley floor near the North Platte River and stretch eastward into the forests of the Snowy Mountain Range. The ranch provides crucial habitat for greater sage-grouse, elk, mule deer, and moose.

During the closing of the easement, Valerie Condict said "we are extremely blessed to be given the opportunity to conserve our family ranch for future generations. Agriculture and stewardship of the land has been a way of life since 1884, and we look forward to continuing that tradition. We want to thank everyone who helped make this conservation easement possible."

The conservation easement was funded in part by the Natural Resource Conservation Service and the Wyoming Wildlife Natural Resource Trust

Kurt Bucholz Conservation Award

Ogden Driskill, winner of the 2020 Bucholz Award, was recognized for his exceptional support of agricultural land conservation, private property, and water rights. Driskill was nominated by his daughter Andrea Wood, U.S. Senator Cynthia Lummis, and State Policy Director for Senator Lummis Tyler Lindholm.

Driskill is a founding board member of the Wyoming Stock Growers Land Trust (WSGLT) and has partnered with WSGLT to place two conservation easements on his personal and family-owned properties at the base of Devils Tower – the nation's first National Monument. These conservation easements permanently protect the viewsheds around the monument and ensure the ranch stays in production. The ranch supports wetland and irrigation projects, uses holistic practices, and has pioneered techniques using sheep, goats, and flea beetles to combat noxious weeds and re-establish native vegetation. Driskill is also a member of the Farm Bureau and Wyoming Stock Growers Association.

Senator Lummis, who served on the WSGLT Board of Directors with Driskill in its early years, commented on his dedication to agricultural conservation saying, "Ogden has conserved essential elements of our Wyoming heritage and protected our core tie to the land that binds us as a state."

Driskill has been a strong advocate for Wyoming's agricultural conservation on a national level, where he has testified for the U.S. House of Representatives Agricultural Committee, consulted with the USDA, and provided testimony for multiple farm bills. Driskill was instrumental in changing Wyoming's perpetuity law, which helped establish the first land trust accreditation program in the United States, and lobbied for land trust insurance policies. As a Wyoming state legislator, Driskill has sponsored and supported numerous bills that impact our state's agricultural and conservation values. Driskill was a founding member of the Partnership of Rangeland Trusts, a partnership of agriculture-focused land trusts with over 3 million acres under conservation easement. WSGLT is proud to be a part of that legacy.

"There is no question that Ogden has been a tireless advocate for ranching and conservation throughout the United States. His past and current efforts have had an everlasting impact on Wyoming, its lands, water, wildlife and people-keeping Wyoming the way we have known it for the future," stated Tyler Lindholm in his endorsement of Driskill.
