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Little Jack Creek Ranch





Down a rural county road and three right turns along the way, you are led into a valley of crisp autumn colors that house Joe Kaspar's place on Little Jack Creek in Carbon County. The property is home to deer, elk, pronghorn antelope, and cattle at various times throughout the year. The vast views show no neighboring houses and even allow for a glimpse of Elk Mountain.

Kaspar purchased this property ten years ago after eyeing it for some time. He grew up in Rawlins, attended the University of Wyoming and returned home to his father's petroleum business. The business started as Phillips 66 and a couple of service stations, and when his father turned the business over to him, he opened a couple of convenience stores, a truck stop, and fuel deliverv business.

"That's how I found this place," said Kaspar. "I drove down the hill delivering gas, saw the place, and thought, 'wow, I like this, I'd like to have it sometime."

The ranch offers a place of solitude, beauty, water, and wildlife. There are a few groves of trees, natural springs and creeks of water, the remnants of corrals from an old sheep operation, two small bunk houses, a cabin and garage; things to make for a relaxing get away.

Snow drifts throughout the winter making this home nearly impossible to get to mid-October through early May. Kaspar noted he has seen snow drifts last until August. While the snow may seem burdensome, it provides consistent water to the springs throughout the property. The tree groves on the property are dense and provide a hideout for wildlife. Kaspar placed trail cameras in one valley of trees to watch the deer and elk that pass through, enjoying the abundant food, water, and security.

While Kaspar traveled a lot over the years, including completing a foreign exchange program in Sweden during his time in high school, Wyoming is the place he calls home.

"I traveled a lot, but I like the open spaces that Wyoming has to offer," he shared. "I like being outdoors and in the country."

The 1,019 acres of property owned by Kaspar was placed in a conservation easement with the Wyoming Stock Growers Land Trust less than a year ago.

Kaspar talked to his attorney who mentioned a few different groups that do easements, but the Wyoming Stock Growers Land Trust stood out to him. He wanted to ensure it would remain a ranch going forward and knew an agricultural conservation easement with the Wyoming Stock Growers Land Trust would allow the land to be utilized for agriculture in the future.

He appreciates the work the Wyoming Stock Growers Land Trust did to make this conservation easement happen and shared that he is glad he doesn't have to worry too much about the ranch.

"I want to keep this place the way it has been for the last 100 years and maybe for the next 100 years," Kaspar shared.



"I never really intended to do an easement but as time goes on and you go around the state and start seeing more and more subdivisions you have to do something," said Kaspar.

"Agriculture is critical, and wildlife can and should co-exist," said Kaspar.

Monthly Donations

Gifts of Stock

Stocks, bonds and securities can be transferred directly to the Land Trust and will then be sold by our advisors for profit.

Crypto Donations

Donating cryptocurrency is a non-taxable event, meaning you do not owe capital gains tax on the appreciated amount and can deduct it on your taxes. Bitcoin, Ethereum and other cryptocurrency donations are one of the most tax efficient ways to support the Land Trust.

Donors may identify a specific asset or sum of money, a percentage of an asset or of their entire estate, or a residual amount after other heirs have been taken care of

Supporters may also designate the Wyoming Stock Growers Land Trust as a sole or partial beneficiary of a retirement plan such as an IRA or 401(k).

Donors making gifts by bequest retain the flexibility of changing their bequests as their needs (and the needs of their heirs) change, and their bequests will pass to the Wyoming Stock Growers Land Trust free of estate taxes.

Planned Giving Fund Options

Donors of planned gifts may specify how they want the proceeds of their gifts to be used to help the Wyoming Stock Growers Land Trust achieve its mission.

Unrestricted funds

Available for use at the Land Trust's discretion in areas where the most need exists.

Ag Land Conservation Fund

The Land Trust helps landowners protect their land, not just during their lifetimes, but in perpetuity. This restricted fund was created to ensure the Land Trust has adequate financial resources to meet the permanent responsibility of monitoring and enforcing its conservation easements. Donations to this fund shall be invested and managed as a restricted fund.

Ranchland Succession Fund

The Land Trust initiated this fund to address the issue of disappearing ag lands across Wyoming. The intention of the fund is to identify tools to ensure the next generation of Wyoming producers remain on the land and keep private, working land in agriculture.

Cultural Landscape Fund


This Fund was established in memory of Alvin Weiderspahn, who served on the Wyoming Stock Growers Land Trust's Board of Directors from 2009 until his death in 2014, to help private landowners maintain lands through ranching culture. Funds in this account will be directed by the Land Trust to assist with voluntary conservation of private ranch lands. Donations to this fund may be utilized for traditional conservation purposes, such as the acquisition of conservation easements or costs associated with completing that work, estate or succession planning assistance to ranching families, or to further awareness and conservation of ranch culture.
